SLAM POETRY AT GLADESVILLE

'A word after a word after a word is power.' - Margaret Atwood


There are many studies which suggest that creative writing can help children develop self-esteem, mindfulness, feelings of achievement, empowerment, and empathy. In addition, as Paulo Coelho suggests, "*Tears are words that need to be written*"; as a cathartic exercise it is invaluable. The last few weeks in grade 5/6 have not only backed up these studies but demonstrated the exceptional power of the written word.

Slam Poetry is an honest and passionate form of poetry written for performance, in which the poet shares their most powerful thoughts, passions, fears or dreams. It is deeply personal, often moving and even confronting and can have a profound effect on the audience. In addition to rhyme, rhythm and poetic devices, slam poetry demands of the poet a huge amount of vulnerability and courage. When we began our slam poetry unit in grade 5/6, I asked the students to be as vulnerable and real as they felt they could. They brought it. The resulting poetry is a privileged glimpse into the raw, touching, honest, sometimes hilarious, sometimes painful, thought provoking minds and hearts of a courageous group of young people. They are simply exceptional.

Next term, it is our intention that an invited audience (that's you!) will attend our first poetry slam and be moved and amazed by the passion and honesty of a truly remarkable group of writers as they perform their poems. We look forward to sharing their poetry and to proving Margaret Atwood's quote above. As a teaser, we have included some of the students' lines from their poems from our inspiration wall. Behind the scenes in Mathematics

Time: Is it an illusion?

Time is different from most attributes that are commonly measured in school. It cannot be seen or felt. Time does not use the metric system. It is something that is always there but maybe not at the same time. Time is more difficult for students to comprehend because units of time need to be matched against a given time period or duration (Walle, Karp, Bay-Williams, Brass, 2019).

Albert Einstein once said, "Time is relative; its only worth depends upon what we do as it is passing".

This month I went out and asked some Grade 3s for their thoughts on time. The interviews went like this:

Mr K

Grade 4 Teacher

Interviewee: Lucas G. Grade 2/3

What is time?

Time would... It is the past and future. Time is what goes around. It is sound and movement.

Why is it important?

It tells us about umm... It actually helps us move. Because if there is no time we can't move. We would be paused if there is no time.

What is your favourite part about learning time and clocks? What have you learnt about it?

It helps us learn about the clock. I learnt how to make a clock.

What is challenging about learning time?

Like when you don't know what the clock is telling you.

Albert Einstein said that time is an illusion. What does he mean by that?

Because like. Your brain and eyes are playing tricks on you which means it is an illusion.

What is time?

It's like, so you know what to do and when to do it. If you never had time you wouldn't know when to go to school or when work starts. Life would just be weird without time.

Why is it important?

Its because you will never know for example when you would go home or when dance class starts.

What is your favourite part about learning time?

Time is just important.

What is challenging about learning time?

Nothing, for me. Because every time a question on time came up, I would raise my hand and be so close to bursting (calling out).

What is time?

I find that hard to explain. Time is time. For example, 1:30 or 2 o'clock.

Why is it important?

Sometimes if you need to be at a party at a certain time. It could be at 3 o'clock or 4 o'clock

What is challenging about learning time?

I find quarter to or quarter past challenging.


